Greer loses contract and contacts

IAN Greer Associates, the lobbying firm named in last year's cash-for-questions row, is having a run of bad luck.

First, it lost the contract to represent the Big Eight accountancy firms, worth more than £100,000 in fees a year. Then a handful of other clients deserted.

Now three staff are joining APCO, a start-up rival being launched next week by a company called GCI, which is big in public relations.

Former Greer director Simon Milton and two colleagues, Angie Bray and John Fraser, resigned in February and have been champing ever since. I gather that, since they left, two other executives have resigned.

The disc, Return to Malibu, was released last week by Freestyle Records, whose spokesman says it is "a wonderful appreciation of basic human instincts, feelings and longings". Murray, 38,

apparently has a "distinct new sound. A mixture of jangly guitars, catchy riffs and melodies, an energising drum beat." Freestyle's blurb says he learned to play the guitar, aged eight, with two pieces of wood and an elastic band. He was a fan of the New Wave music in the late 1970s. Of the title, Murray says: "Maybe it sums up the notion of returning to something you've always wanted to do." I'm not sure that's possible, but what do I know?
